## From the Priest

Well, who would have thought it . . . ?

As the 9:15 Easter Service ended, and I turned from the dismissal to move toward the narthex to wish each one of you a Happy Easter, I saw at least a dozen other members scattered on the lawn in front of the church, looking up toward the roof. Their faces bespoke curiosity,



startled attention, their attention tethered somewhere between lawn and the space above my head. “Claire, you need to come look at this,” they said, anchored in place but gesturing to me with their hands, pulling me toward them.

I admit it. Even with the glory of the Easter Vigil and the Family Eucharist with Baptism

still shining in my memory, my first thought was, “Oh, man! It’s Easter! The last thing I want to do is face a new problem with the roof—shingles blown off, a tree limb crashed through the sheathing, insulation bared to the sky and waving in the breeze.” But that wasn’t the problem. In fact, there was no problem at all. Just an elegant white dove, calmly perched in the sunshine where the steeple meets the peak of the narthex roof. A white dove just gazing out over the green canopy that now surrounds the church, even while the bell tolled in the steeple and worshippers poured out of the church entrance, heading for the Easter egg hunt and other festivities. Cameras appeared, many took photos as Easter

souvenirs, and eventually all of us—including the dove--departed for whatever was to unfold next.

You do realize that we had just finished a baptism? Aidan William Sedelnick, age 9, became part of the body of Christ that morning. We all made promises about our lives, we blessed water by offering God thanks for the many times and ways water has been used to bring us new life, and then I poured serious quantities of water over his head—hot water, he said. Then I anointed him lavishly with sweet-scented oil of chrism and made the sign of the cross, sealing him with the Holy Spirit and marking Aidan as Christ’s own forever. We dressed him in a white robe of the baptized and introduced him to his new household of brothers and sisters in Christ. We greeted each other in the peace of the Lord. We said our prayers of thanksgiving to God for the love poured out on us. We shared the feast of Jesus, honey-laced wheat bread and sweet wine.

And then, unbeknownst to any of us but the few who were taking a break between services, a white dove descended onto our roof. I didn’t hear a voice saying, “Aidan is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased.” What I heard was “You are all my Beloved Sons and Daughters—every one of you—and blessed with my presence

and my protection and providence everywhere, all the time."

White doves, baptismal water and chrism, bread and wine. God is not present just in these outward, visible signs. Instead, these things, like steeples and naves, focus our attention toward Jesus' Real Presence wherever and whenever we are gathered as the Community of the Beloved, the Church. Jesus' blood flows through our hearts; his flesh becomes our flesh. By the grace of God, Jesus' life becomes our life. Jesus is not limited to these things-- *focus*, not *locus*, the seminary slogan goes-- but white



doves, baptismal water and chrism, bread and wine are holy windows through which we see the Life into which God is giving us new birth.

At the end of the Great Flood, Noah recognized the dove's returning, and then not returning, as a sign that the waters of death were retreating, that creation had been cleansed from its pride, and that human life could start again. Maybe, as a former rector told me on Monday, that dove came from a flock near Kingston that is rented out for weddings and such. Maybe, as I was told, that dove just didn't know which direction home was. But about this I have no doubt: the Holy Spirit did rest on us in blessing last Sunday morning, in prayer, song, water, chrism, bread, wine, and yes, on the wings of a snow-white dove. When we saw that dove, we gasped at just how beloved we really are. We lifted our faces and hearts up. It was right, and a truly good and joyful thing, then, in silent surprise to give thanks to God, Who always and everywhere returns to gather us

## Resurrection's Summer Sabbatical

Our rector, Claire Keene begins her 12-week sabbatical in a couple more weeks. Church of the Resurrection will not be just plod along without her until she returns in August. We will also begin a special time of our own for 12 weeks. A Parish Sabbatical Committee has been working for many months to plan "Resurrection's Summer Sabbatical". We will have familiar events such as the Pentecost/Pig Roast in June and Second Saturday Suppers, but we will also have many opportunities to do new things including Family Friendly Fridays beginning in June and a Grace Point Sunday in July. Each month we will have publicity about upcoming events.

Special Sundays - Receptions for us to say "Bon Voyage" and "Welcome Back" to Claire and Mike, Contemporary Music, Pentecost/Pig Roast, Outdoor Services with a Hotdog Roast and a Grace Point Sunday.

Family Friendly Fridays - Every other Friday beginning June 17<sup>th</sup> that includes making crafts to send to Claire and a special craft for the "Welcome Back" reception. For dinner we will have a Salad Supper. The church will provide lettuce and greens with everyone else bringing all the stuff to add to it such as tomatoes, onion, green peppers, croutons, cheese, etc.

A Shared Reading - Parishioners can read a book over the 12 weeks that Claire will also be reading during her sabbatical. The book is *Living Jesus: Learning the Heart of the Gospel* by Luke Timothy Johnson. There are 12 chapters and 12 weeks. Parishioners will have the opportunity to discuss their reading in between the services on each Sunday beginning May 22<sup>nd</sup>. We will write down questions or themes from these discussions. Claire will also write down questions or themes from her reading. Adult Sunday School in the fall will be a response to our reading. We have 20 books available for the summer reading and we can order more if needed.

Notes from the Lake - Claire will be sending a note to the parish from her sabbatical every few weeks. We will include these notes as an insert for the bulletin or in the newsletter.

Sabbatical Calendars will be handed out after Sunday services and available in the parish hall.

In closing, I look forward to seeing some familiar faces, as well as new faces, very soon. I am grateful for the opportunity to return to Church of the Resurrection and spend the next few months with you.

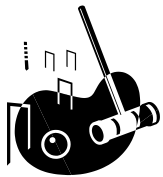

## LCES Summer Reading Camp needs VOLUNTEERS

Lenoir City Elementary will be having a summer reading camp for current first grade students in the RtI program. These students are currently working on a below grade level in reading. This camp will be one week in June (June 13-17) and one week in July (July 11-15). The hours of the camp are from 9:00-11:30. A snack will be provided. Students will each receive a "Flat Wormy" and a journal. They will take their worm and journal home each day and write about their adventures. When the students return, they will share their adventures with "Flat Wormy". We will read the story *The Diary of a Worm*. We will have real worms for students to play with and observe. They will be able to journal their observations. Students will plant seeds. Students will work in small groups at centers doing literacy activities and playing games to increase their literacy/reading skills. Students will rotate through the centers throughout the week. They will work on a Reader's Theater performance for their parents at the end of the week.

Volunteers can help with the center activities (sight words, word building, sentence building, read to students, listen to students read to them, word families, etc).

## Appeal for Help from Chattanooga

As we hear about particular needs in the diocese related to the devastating storms that passed through East Tennessee on Wednesday, we will pass along that information.

This evening we received a request from Metropolitan Ministries in Chattanooga, one of our Jubilee Ministries.

Rebecca Whelchel, the organization's executive director, said seven tornadoes hit Chattanooga in rapid succession Wednesday, leaving a 35-mile path of destruction. Whelchel said the devastation in the area is tremendous and Metropolitan Ministries is in an area currently without electricity. Estimates are that it could take as long as eight days before electricity is restored.

"Clean-up and support will take a long time," Whelchel said, "but right now, in this first acute phase, we need emergency financial support. Right now, we're using funds from the Red Cross, but per a disaster response meeting today, it is understood that will be available for only about a week."

Whelchel said that there is plenty of food and water coming in and they have more than enough volunteers; it is financial support that is needed.

The Appalachian Kids Camp will be held this summer, July 5 - 7, at Grace Point. Its purpose is to serve the underprivileged children (rising 3rd through 5th graders) of rural Appalachia. Second, **donations are welcome**. You might consider helping with the cost of camp registration (\$135/camper), or a small donation for camper supplies.
